# The Auburn Account

### 2019 Grant Update

Town administration continued to aggressively seek and apply for grant funding to augment programs, services and equipment.

During calendar year 2019, town administration applied for 24 grants totaling \$1,873,507.30. Of those grant applications, 18 were received totaling \$1,034,763.30, while 6 are pending.

The grants received provided funding for a new regional fire training tower, 2 new firefighters, Drury Square improvements, dog park design, Independence Day concert, LED lighting, emergency equipment, programs for seniors, planning assistance, green energy programs, infrastructure improvements, police training and equipment, Library programs, CodeRED, public safety programs and more.

Since 2011, town administration has applied for 275 grants totaling \$16,054,891.84 in requests. A total of 239 grants have been received totaling \$5,341,782.78 since 2011. A total of 11 grants are pending.

All department and division heads are encouraged to continually seek alternate funding sources to augment their programs and services, a goal which is incorporated into each evaluation form. We thank our employees for seeking grant funding throughout the year to offset taxpayer dollars.

Town administration will continue to seek and secure grant and foundation funds to support the priority needs and goals of the Town.

# **News from the Town Clerk...**



#### **CENSUS**

2020 annual street listing forms will be mailed at the beginning of January. Please fill out, sign and return promptly even if there a no changes. If someone living in your household has moved you may indicate that, if they are a registered voter they must sign to be removed. There is a line for moved household members to sign or give the address we will mail a form for them to sign at their new address. Voters are made in-

active in June of each year if the census is not updated.

This creates long lines at elections when a voter is made inactive. Then the voter must fill out a form and provide proof that they still live at their Auburn address.

#### **2020 United States Census**

March 2020. The United States Census is conducted every 10 years. Census invitations will be mailed or delivered to every household in the nation starting in mid-March. The survey will ask you to provide information that is accurate for your household or where you reside **most** of the year, as of April 1, 2020.



#### **Dog Licensing**

On the bottom of the census form is a dog license form for 2020. To license by mail, fill out the form and enclose a check to cover the fee. Registration Period is January 1, 2020—March 31, 2020. Town bylaw imposes a \$10.00 late fee per dog if not licensed by April 30, 2020. If you would prefer to license on-line please use <a href="https://www.mapsonline.net/auburnma/dog\_licensing">https://www.mapsonline.net/auburnma/dog\_licensing</a> If you have licensed a dog in the past you will be able to license with this link, provided your rabies is up to date. Any person seventy (70) years of age or older, upon proof of age and ownership shall be exempt from the annual fee for one dog, per household, per year.

#### CONFLICT OF INTEREST REQUIREMENT

The Summary of the Conflict of Interest Law has been distributed. Committee Mem-

bers are considered Municipal Employees for the purposes of this law. If you serve on a committee or volunteer in some capacity and have not received the Summary in the mail or as an email attachment, please contact the Town Clerk's office at (508)832-7701 or on the website at: https://www.auburnguide.com/246/Conflict-of-Interest-Information Some part-time volunteer positions are exempt.

The Summary and a list of exempt positions are on the Town Website auburnguide.com - Town Clerk department - Conflict of Interest.

The annual conflict of interest law education and training requirement compliance period runs from December 10, 2019 through April 10, 2020.

Training is every two years and training was due in 2019 - the acknowledgement is due every year.

Exemption applications – Seniors over 67, Surviving Spouses, Blind and Disabled Veterans for

FY2020 as well as applications for Deferral and Small Commercial Exemptions will be accepted through March 31, 2020. If you received an exemption for FY 2019 you would have received your application for FY 2020 shortly after Labor Day. We have relaxed some of the financial and age requirements for some of our exemptions, so even if you did not qualify last year, it is possible you might for the current year. If you have any questions regarding your qualifications for one of these exemptions please contact the Assessor's Office at (508) 832-7708.

FY 2020 Business Personal Property Form of Lists (state tax form 2) have been mailed to all businesses that were in operation for January 1, 2019. For any new businesses, forms are available on the town website at <a href="https://www.auburnguide.com">www.auburnguide.com</a> or from the Assessor's Office. Your form of list should be returned to the Assessor's office no later than March 1, 2020. If you were in business as of January 1<sup>st</sup> 2020 you <a href="must\_must\_file">must\_file</a> a form of list with the Assessors Officer per MGL Ch.

Any properties filing for an exemption as property held for Charitable Purposes under MGL Chapter 59 §5 and §29 must file their State Tax form 3ABC prior to March 1st in order to be granted an exemption for the upcoming year.

It is important to us that your tax assessments are equitable and correct. One of the most important parts of our job is to be out inspecting properties and verifying that the information we base your assessment on is up to date and accurate. We inspect all sales, building permits and all properties in town are visited on a cyclical basis throughout the year. If you receive an orange tag

or a letter notifying you that we are working in your neighborhood, please call and set an appoint-

ment at your convenience.

As a reminder, any employees or representatives of the Assessor's Office will always have Town issued identification with them, and a generally driving a town vehicle that is clearly marked. Do not ever allow entry to your property by a person who does not have proper identification.

# **Veterans Services**

Limits on VA-backed home loans for qualified buyers will be eliminated effective on Jan. 1, 2020 — due to changes in the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 passed in June.VA-backed home loans provides eligible veterans an option to purchase a home without a downpayment by guaranteeing part of the loan. Additionally, this often encourages lenders to provide veterans with more generous terms.

Under the current set up, VA loan limits vary across the U.S. and range from \$484,350 to \$726,525 based on county, according to Veterans United Home Loans. If veterans eligible for full VA loan entitlement want to purchase a home that ex-

ceeds the designated loan limit for their county, they must pay a downpayment calculated by subtracting the loan limit from the cost of the home. Veterans then pay a quarter of the difference. But these county limits for those eligible for full VA loan entitlement purchases will

go away in the new year, meaning that more veterans can purchase homes without shelling out a downpayment. Limits will still remain intact for veterans with diminished VA loan entitlement though. This can happen for a variety of reasons, including defaulting on a

previous VA loan. Even so, the VA claims that 90 percent of veterans using a VA-backed home loan already do not pay a downpayment.

Those interested in purchasing a home with a VA-backed loan must meet several qualifications, based on length of service and other factors. Learn more about whether you qualify for a VA home loan program here.

According to a study Veterans United Home Loans released last month, more than 624,000 veterans and service members took advantage of VA-backed home loan benefits in fiscal year 2019.

That makes 2019 the eighth consecutive year that the number of VA purchase loans has risen, and marks a 43 percent increase when measured against numbers from fiscal year 2014.

The report also found that Millennials, those born between 1981 and 1996, and Generation Z, those born between 1997 and 2012, comprised 45 percent of all VA purchase loans in fiscal year 2019.

"Younger veterans and service members are fueling the continued growth of this historic loan program," Chris Birk, director of Education for Veterans United Home

Loans, said in a news release.

"This benefit was built to help boost access to homeownership for those who serve, and it's helping a new generation of veterans and military families put down roots in communities across the country," he added.

Areas where veterans most frequently utilized VA home loans included Washington, D.C., Phoenix, Virginia Beach and Atlanta.






# **PUBLIC SAFETY NEWS**

## **Development Guides**

The Economic Development Committee and the Economic Development Coordinator developed a series of development guides for prospective businesses. # Economic Development and Planning Grant Updates The Town applied to the Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs in Febru-

ary 2019 for a Planning Assistance grant to help establish clear design guidelines for Drury Square with architectural renderings. We were extremely fortunate to have the support of dedicated CMRPC staff to help us create the guidelines. The draft design guidelines are complete and the architectural renderings are underway and should be completed in January of 2020. Once completed, the guidelines and renderings will be posted on Auburnguide.com under Eco-

Town Administration also received a grant from the Massachusetts Department

of Housing and Community Development for Technical Assistance through their Massachusetts Downtown Initiative program for the development of a Wayfinding and Branding Project for Drury Square. Favermann Design and the Wayfinding Committee have been hard at work to design a slogan and wayfinding elements that embody the Drury Square area. The final proposal should be going before the Board of Selectmen in early 2020 for their approval. We are looking forward to implementing wayfinding elements to the downtown area.

#### **Development Coordinating Group: A Year in Review**



Group reviewed approximately 45 projects or licenses in 2019. The Development Coordinating Group (DCG) consists of representatives from municipal departments and the Water District who review proposed

site plans, events and Board of Selectmen license applications. During these meetings applicants can ask questions and departments can provide recommendations and input as to what permits or approvals will be required. The DCG meets every first and third Wednesday of the month. This group is a valuable resource for future and existing business owners. We had a busy year and look forward to reviewing more exciting projects in 2020.

The Business Roundtable was established in 2011 in an effort to to foster communication and dialogue between the Town and the business community in order to promote business expansion, attract new businesses, retain existing industry, and create an environment in which businesses can thrive. Participants on the Business Roundtable, which consists of business and commercial/industrial property owners, presidents and general managers, provide valuable input to the Town on the strengths and challenges of doing business in Auburn, identify issues that impact business, and identify programs and/or services that would assist or enhance their operations. The Town has utilized the input of the Business Roundtable to formulate strategies to meet the needs of the

# **LED Streetlight Conversion Project**

The Town and its project managers at Real Term Energy and Arden Engineering

Contractors have nearly finalized the conversion process of Auburn's LED street-lights. From September through December, several lighting contractors were accompanied by police detail throughout town to swap out over 1,000 LED street-lights. The Town is in the process of completing wireless dimming modules on the final 10% of lights and expects to have all of the eligible LED lights automated by the end of January 2020.

As one of five communities, Auburn is participating in the Massachusetts Rapid

Retrofit Program administered by the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC). This qualifies the Town for a 30% cost reduction on product and installation costs of the LED streetlight project courtesy of the Department of Energy Resources (DOER). The Town had previously been awarded a \$229,599 Green Communities Grant from DOER last year in addition to the 30% reduction. The true value of this grant will be determined once installation is complete, but the 30% reduction is a considerable savings that shall be directed towards additional energy efficiency projects in the future.


