AUBURN NIGHT AT THE WOOSOX!

Throughout the 2022 season, the Worcester Red Sox ("WooSox") will host different towns in Central and Western Massachusetts at Polar Park in Worcester for "Town Takeover" nights. Tickets purchased for each "Town Takeover" night will benefit a non-profit organization that benefits that town and/or broader community. At the end of the season, the town with the largest turnout will be rewarded with a trophy and special recognition.

"Auburn Night" will be held Wednesday night, June 15th. The game starts at 6:45 PM. Various residents of Auburn will be featured in the pregame ceremonies and throughout the ballgame.

Tickets purchased though the FEVO link or QR code for Auburn Night are available for Simply Orthodontics Berm (Seating on LF Grass Berm) or the Third Base Field Box (Fixed 3B Field Box Seat). Each ticket purchased through this link will not only benefit the Officer Ronald Tarentino, Jr. Charitable Fund, but will also contribute towards Auburn's standing in the WooSox "Town Takeover" competition. However, tickets purchased through these mechanisms will not benefit the Officer Ronald Tarentino, Jr. Charitable Fund and seating may not be in the same areas as the saved inventory for Auburn Night available through DEVO or the QR code.

The WooSox have a special Ticket Offer (Presented by National Grid) on Wednesdays, including Auburn Night on June 15th, in which first responders receive 4 free tickets on Wednesdays when showing their credentials at the WooSox Ticket Office. (Note that tickets redeemed at the Ticket office through First Responder Wednesdays do not benefit the Officer Ronald J. Tarentino Charitable Fund.)

The Ronald J. Tarentino Charitable Fund (<u>https://tarentinocharitablefund.org/</u>) was established in 2018 to honor Police Officer Ron Tarentino, Jr.'s memory. On May 22, 2016 Auburn Police Officer Tarentino was tragically killed in the line of duty while conducting a traffic stop in Auburn. At the time of his death, Officer Tarentino had been on the Auburn Police Department for two years; before coming to Auburn, he had been on the Town of Leicester Police Department for seven years.

The Officer Ronald Tarentino, Jr. Charitable Fund has a multi-purpose focus:

Acts of Kindness — The Fund seeks to help alleviate the physical and emotional burden of those who suffer from a serious illness, injury, or loss by providing assistance to their families in their time of need.

Acts of Generosity — The Fund seeks to offer scholarships to high school seniors for higher education who have demonstrated a commitment to their community, to their education, and to a future role in a field of service to others.

Service to the Community — The Fund seeks to physically support other first responder & military non-profit organizations that offer similar support of families.

AUBURN POLICE DEPARTMENT



There has been a whirlwind of change at the Police Department since the start of the year.

Chief Andrew Sluckis retired on January 31st after thirty-four years of police work and over sixteen as the Police Chief in Auburn.

On February 1, 2022, Town Manager Julie Jacobson appointed Todd R. Lemon as the Provisional Police Chief. That same day, Chief Lemon appointed R. Scott Mills as a Provisional Lieutenant.

On February 15, 2022 Chief Lemon was able to appoint Spiros Kaperonis as a Provisional Sergeant and Dominic Walker as a full-time police officer.

There will be promotional assessment centers offered by the department on April 14 and 15, 2022 to solidify all open supervisory positions. We hope to have those results by the end of May.

Sergeant Kaperonis is a veteran police officer who has served in the patrol division for his entire career at the APD. Known for his strong work ethic and sense of humor, Sergeant Kaperonis is assigned to the 3-11 shift where he is supervising and mentoring some of our younger officers.

Officer Walker comes to the APD from the Rutland Police Department where he served as a patrol officer and detective. Officer Walker brings a variety of experience and training to the



APD and isn't just a "new guy". He lives in town with his wife, infant son and dog and is now the officer who holds the title of "shortest commute to work" at the APD, logging a mere half mile each way to and from work.

In keeping with Chief Lemon's goals of providing the highest levels of service to the community, Officer Jon O'Brien was selected to be the next School Resource Officer (SRO) for the department. Officer O'Brien is well known in the community after twenty years with the APD and has volunteered with numerous programs and philanthropic efforts. He will be attending training programs that certify SRO's and will be up and running when the next school year starts.

CENSUS

CENSUS – 2022 census forms were mailed the first week of January. Please fill out and return if you have not already done this, even if there were no changes. There are many households who have not answered the census. Voters are made inactive in June of each year if the census is not updated. This creates long lines at the elections; because each inactive voter must fill out a form and provide proof that they still live at their Auburn address

DOG LICENSING

The office is currently licensing dogs for 2022. Last year's license expired as of March 31, 2022. If your dog has been licensed in the past and is up to date on rabies and would prefer to license on-line, please use the following link: <u>https://www.mapsonline.net/auburnma/dog_licensing</u>—Town Clerk Department, Dog Licenses & Information, the Dog license application can be printed and mailed in. Please verify that the rabies on file is current or send a copy with the application or your census form. If your dog can not get a rabies vaccine, owners will need to submit a letter. Letters need to be submitted annually to be reviewed by the Animal Control Officer and the Board of Health for acceptance, per MGL Chapter 140 Section 145B, (i). Owners will not receive a license for unvaccinated dogs without approval of their exemption letter.

Please be aware of January 1st, 2022 there was a fee increase for delinquent dog accounts. It is important to note that this increase did NOT affect any owners who licensed on time or within the same calendar year of the licensing due date. This delinquency fee will ONLY affect owners who have failed to previously license for a full calendar year or longer. This fee will include the full cost of a dog license for the year, or years, that the dog was not licensed with the Town.

If you no longer have your dog, you must report that information to the Town Clerk's Office so your dog can be removed from the system. If you have any questions, please contact the Town Clerk's Office at 508-832-7701 or Animal Control at 508-832-7703.

BUILDING SAFETY MONTH



The Town of Auburn joins International Code Council for the celebration of Building Safety Month 2022

Auburn, Massachusetts – In May 2022, The Town of Auburn will participate in the 42nd annual Building Safety Month, a worldwide campaign presented by the International Code Council, its members and partners to promote building safety. This year's campaign, "Safety for All: Building Codes in Action,"

raises awareness about the importance of building codes in ensuring safety in the spaces in which we live, work and learn.

Homes and buildings that are built in compliance with building safety codes and the officials who enforce the codes are essential to helping communities become affordable, resilient, and energy and water-efficient. Building Safety Month provides homeowners, government officials, and the public with the necessary information and resources to prepare and protect our built environment.

This year's campaign themes are: Week One, May 1-8, Planning for a Safe & Sustainable Tomorrow; Week Two, May 9-15, Exploring Careers in Building Safety; Week Three, May 16-22, Understanding Disaster Mitigation; May 23-31, Creating a Safe & Abundant Water Supply

The Town of Auburn a member of the Code Council, is a Building Safety Month supporter and participant. Through both construction inspections and periodic inspections of existing buildings, the Auburn Building Department and the office of Fire Prevention of the Auburn Fire Rescue Department both work tirelessly to maintain a safe built environment in the Town of Auburn.

With an extensive history dating back to 2200 B.C and the Code of the Hammurabi, king of the Babylonian Empire, building codes have protected the public for thousands of years. Today, the International Codes, developed by the Code Council and adopted by our community, are the most widely used and adopted set of building safety codes in the world.

Reminder to Auburn residents about the Community Choice Power Supply Program

We all know energy costs are rising and that can put a strain on household and business energy usage. Thankfully the Town selected Dynegy Energy Services as the supplier for our municipal aggregation program. This program enables local government to combine the purchasing power of its residents and businesses to provide them with an alternative to National Grid Basic Service. This program allows municipalities to take advantage of a fixed aggregation rate that helps prevent sharp increases of service rates due to weather and other factors. As a result of utilizing Dynegy Energy as the supplier, the Town is able to save residents and busiprogram more than a supplier.

nesses money on their monthly electric bill. You are automatically enrolled into this program as long as you were a NGRID Basic Service member. If you are enrolled in the program you should see "Dynegy" listed under the "Supply Services" section of your monthly bill.

The Town will be soliciting quotes and entering into a new contract when the current contract expires in June.

UPCOMING ZONING BYLAW PROPOSALS

Zoning is foundational to community development because it dictates land usage. Advocates and Town Administration regularly propose minor amendments and new sections of the zoning bylaw. New sections and amendments are sometimes a reaction to wanted or unwanted development, changes can also be an attempt to be proactive and adapt to changing times. There are three proposed changes that will be presented this spring for consideration by Town Meeting.

The first proposed amendment is to add a section regarding animals. Currently the zoning bylaw limits the number of animals

per household to no more than four. This includes dogs, cats, chickens, and any other type of pet or livestock. The proposed change will allow a resident have a greater number of animals and codifies the keeping of certain pets and livestock. For example there is a section that discusses bee keeping including the number of hives and where on a property the hives may be placed. There is also a section on backyard poultry which allows poultry and outlines the placement of coops and runs to protect water sources and neighboring properties from nuisance. Aside from the limited number of animals allowed under the current bylaw the change would allow animal control to more effectively respond to complaints and nuisance animals.

The second change is to allow apartments by right in certain zoning districts. This proposed change is in response to MGL Ch. 161A Sec. 1 naming Auburn as an "MBTA Community." Auburn was named an MBTA Community since it is adjacent to Worcester which has a commuter rail station. The state requires all MBTA Communities to allow apartments by right or with Site Plan Review only in order to be eligible for certain grant programs. These grant programs include the Housing Choice Initiative, the Local Capital Projects Fund, and the Mass-Works infrastructure program. Acting now, the town will remain eligible for these grant programs and comply with the changes to Mass General Law.

The third proposal is to amend items related to the marijuana sections of the zoning bylaw. This includes removing the temporary moratorium wording, allowing dispensaries by right in certain areas of town, and changing some of the site restrictions.



An Informational Session is scheduled for April 18, 2022 at 6pm and will be held in the Board of Selectmen Room on the second floor of Town Hall. BLACKSTONE RIVER REVIVAL!



Clean and green up part of the Blackstone River Watershed! Saturday August 27, 2022 8 am-5 pm

Along the banks of the Blackstone River, the American Industrial Revolution was born, and the Blackstone became known as America's "hardest working river." From its headwaters in Worcester, Massachusetts, to the Pawtucket Falls in Pawtucket, Rhode Island, the Blackstone River and its tributaries were home to over one hundred mills and mill villages, making it one of the busiest industrial areas in the United States.

But industrialization caused problems, and by the 1960s the Blackstone was one of the most polluted rivers in the country. However, the local people did not stand by and let their river be




a sewer. A grassroots group, later named ZAP!, worked hard to stop further pollution of the river and to remove the garbage that others had dumped. Their work paid off, and the river's health keeps getting better.

The Blackstone River is now home to more than twenty species of fish and aquatic mammals like beavers and river otters. Snapping turtles and a variety of birds have also returned. Once America's hardest working river, today the Blackstone is a place of recreation, reflection, and renewal.

Events will be happening all day watershed-wide from Rhode Island to Massachusetts.

Residents on the municipal solid waste & recycling service will have their yard waste collected on their normal trash day during the following weeks:

Please have all yard waste curbside on collection day by 7 am following these guidelines:

- Use open containers or biodegradable bags (plastic bags will NOT be collected)
- Bags/containers must weigh less than 50 pounds
- For twigs and branches, the maximum length is 3 feet. The maximum diameter is 3 inches.
- If containing twigs and branches with ties, the ties must be string or twine. NO plastic ties or tape.
- **DO NOT** use the carts issued by the Town for trash and recycling for yard waste.

BAKER-POLITO ADMINISTRATION ANNOUNCES AVAILABILITY OF SECOND COVID-19 BOOSTER DOSE FOR RESIDENTS 50 AND OLDER AND IM-MUNOCOMPROMISED INDIVIDUALS

BOSTON (March 30, 2022)— Following updated recommendations from the federal government, the Baker-Polito Administration today announced that all residents aged 50 and older or individuals who are younger with certain medical conditions may now access a second COVID-19 booster. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) on Tuesday recommended that certain immunocompromised individuals and all individuals over the age of 50 get an additional booster dose of COVID-19 vaccines. The decision follows authorization by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for a second booster dose for these groups four months after receiving a first booster of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines. Those eligible include:

Individuals 50 years of age and older at least 4 months after getting a first booster

Individuals 18 and older with certain medical conditions may get a second Moderna booster at least 4 months after first booster

Individuals 12 and older with certain medical conditions may get a second Pfizer booster at least 4 months after the first booster.

Separately and in addition, per the CDC, individuals 18 and older who received a primary vaccine and booster dose of Johnson & Johnson's Janssen COVID-19 vaccine at least 4 months ago may now receive a second booster dose using an mRNA COVID-19 vaccine.

Residents may access booster doses from more than 1,000 locations, with appointments readily available for booking across the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth has capacity to administer over 150,000 boosters weekly across the state.

"Vaccines including boosters are the most effective and widely available tool we have to prevent COVID infection, severe disease, and death," said Dr. Larry Madoff, Medical Director of DPH's Bureau of Infectious Disease and Laboratory Sciences. "It is important that everyone stay up to date on their vaccines. If residents have questions about whether they are eligible to get an additional booster dose, DPH encourages you to talk with your doctor."

If you are eligible, here are the steps to find a convenient location for getting a second COVID-19 Booster:

Visit the Vaxfinder tool at vaxfinder.mass.gov for a full list of hundreds of locations to receive a booster and to book an appointment.

For individuals who are unable to use Vaxfinder, or have difficulty accessing the internet, the COVID-19 Vaccine Resource Line (Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Saturday and Sunday 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.) is available for assistance by calling 2-1-1 and following the prompts. This service is available in English and Spanish and has translators available in approximately 100 additional languages.

Individuals with questions about the booster or their eligibility should contact their healthcare provider.

Vaccines are widely available across the Commonwealth. Getting vaccinated remains the most important thing individuals can do to protect themselves, their families, and their community. Fully vaccinated residents should receive a COVID-19 booster shot when they are eligible to increase their protection against COVID-19 and its variants.

The COVID-19 booster is safe, effective, and free. Additional information on the COVID-19 booster, including FAQs, can be found at mass.gov/COVID19booster.

Massachusetts leads the nation in vaccine administration, over 80% of the eligible population (5+) is fully vaccinated, and more than half are boosted. According to Bloomberg, the Commonwealth currently ranks 5th in the nation for percent of population with a booster dose.





STREET SWEEPING



Spring street sweeping is starting on April 1st! In addition to beautification, street sweeping has the added benefits of preserving the roadway pavement and improving water quality. The order of sweeping is as follows:, Precinct 3, Precinct 4, Precinct 5, Precinct 1, and Precinct 2.

RESIDENTIAL LEAF AND BRUSH DISPOSAL

Ready to start spring cleaning? The Leaf and Brush Disposal area allows residents to dispose of yard waste items at a low cost. The leaf and brush pile opens on March 21, 2022 and, weather permitting, the hours are as follows:

Monday - Friday: 8am-1pm

Saturday + Sunday: 9am-3pm

Permits are valid from July 1 to June 3 0, and are available to Town residents for purchase at the drop-off site at 5 Millbury Street for \$25 (\$20 for Senior Citizens).



PINROCK ROAD FORCE MAIN

The Pinrock Road pump station is the largest wastewater pumping station in Auburn, which conveys all of the wastewater flow from the Town to the Upper Blackstone Clean Water (UBCW) treatment facility. A redundant 20-inch diameter sewer force main will be installed from the pump station to the UBCW property, to ensure resiliency of the critical force main and to aid in future maintenance. The work will begin on Monday March 14, starting at the pump station and continuing down Rose Lane and across Southwest Cutoff (Route 20) towards the UBCW property. Traffic patterns may be disrupted on Rose Lane, Greenwood Street, and Southwest Cutoff during the work. Affected residents shall be notified in advance of any traffic or utility disruptions that directly impact access to their property. For any questions about the project, please call 508-823-7811.
